Here Comes Tax Day!

This Monday, April 15th, is Tax Day.

Tax Day is a colloquial term for the day on which individual income tax returns are due to the federal government. Income tax was first introduced in the United States of America in 1861. A rate of three percent was levied on **incomes** above \$800 per year and the resulting revenue was used to help fund the American Civil War effort. However, income tax was seen as unconstitutional and the law was repealed in 1872. The idea of a tax on personal income, at a rate of two percent, was reintroduced in the Revenue Act of 1894, but the legal status of this kind of tax was still unclear. In 1913, the "Sixteenth Amendment" to the Constitution of the United States was ratified.

This cleared the way for the modern income tax system in the USA.

Originally, the deadline for filing federal taxes, or Tax Day, was on March 1st. However, it changed to different dates over the years. After WWI, it was moved to March 15th and eventually was changed to April 15th during the 1950s. However, if that date falls on the weekend or on a holiday, then it is extended to the next business day.




























Kingsbury City Commission


That says it all, doesn't it?!

Full Pink Moon

This Friday, April 19th, is the full moon in April known as the Full Pink Moon.

The Full Pink Moon heralds in the appearance of the "moss pink," or wild ground phlox—one of the first spring flowers. It has also been known as the Grass Moon, the Egg Moon, and the Fish Moon.

These names were used by early Colonial Americans—who learned the names from the local Native Americans; time was not recorded by using the months of the Julian or Gregorian calendar. Many **tribes** kept track of time by observing the seasons and lunar months, although there was much variability. The name itself usually described some activity that occurred during that time in their location.

A TOBACCO CURE.

Lupus Cured by Fumigating Patient with Tobacco Smoke.

Paris, January 9.—Professor Finsen, the famous Danish physician, who received one of the Nobel prizes and who founded the Copenhagen institute which bears his name where hundreds of patients have been cured of the dread disease of lupus, is giving a series of lectures in this city which have been attended by our most prominent medical men.

At one of these he told of an interesting case of a lady who came to his institute suffering from lupus in its most malignant form.

Continued treatment with the Finsen red light failed to improve her condition, and, acting upon an idea of her own, she was fumigated daily with tobacco smoke, and before long she was entirely cured.


The famous professor added, however, that he had no faith in the tobacco cure, though it proved efficient in this case.
