






Kingsbury City Limits




















Kingsbury T-Shirts - Now Available Online!


That says it all, doesn't it?!

Full Wolf Moon

This week the first full moon of 2020 will be on Friday, January 10th.

In Native American and early Colonial times, the Full Moon for January was often called the Full Wolf Moon.

It appeared when wolves **howled** in hunger outside the villages.

Traditionally, the January Moon is also known as the Old Moon (oddly enough since it is the first full moon of the new year) or the Moon After Yule.

To some Native American tribes, this was the Snow Moon, but most applied that name to the next Full Moon, in February.

MOON FOLKLORE:



A bright first Moon promises rain and a bountiful harvest; a red-tinted Moon means a dry year.



A growing Moon and a flowing tide are lucky times to marry.



A halo around the Moon predicts wet or stormy weather.

As for the rest of the January night sky, Venus dazzles us in the southwest sky at sunset. Mercury begins appearing far below and to Venus's right during the final week of the month. Also during the finally week of January, Jupiter will emerge into view low in the southeast just prior to sunrise.

Cheyenne - Moon Of The Strong Cold
Comanche - The Year Moon

Creek - Winter's Younger Brother Moon
Lakota - The Hard Moon
Omaha - Moon When Snow Drifts Into Tipis
Shoshone - The Freezing Moon
Zuni - Moon When Limbs Of Trees Are Broken By Snow
Dakotah Sioux - Moon of the Terrible

Celtic - Quiet Moon Medieval English - Wolf Moon Neo Pagan - Ice Moon Chinese - Holiday Moon



Kingsbury News Past

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

The Saturday, October 9, 1875 edition of the *San Antonio Daily Express* had a report on the "beer on wheels" that was somewhere between San Antonio and Kingsbury. Apparently, Hugo & Schmeltzer ordered a big shipment of "this popular beverage" and it had come in on the train to Kingsbury, the end of the track at that time, and was on a wagon headed for San Antonio. I wonder how long it took to drive a heavily loaded wagon from Kingsbury to San Antonio? The trail riders could probably tell us!



cargo of Cincinnati beer on wheels, between San Antonio and Kingsbury. This live and prosperous house we are glad to see, are constantly receiving large orders of this popular beverage, which they fill with promptness and satisfaction, to their patrons.

Elsewhere in 1875, there was a quite lengthy article on Aaron Burr now that a musket he had captured while serving under Benedict Arnold (while he was still a General for the American forces and before he defected to the British) is on exhibit, and the *Uruguay* steamer had some pretty close calls with Spanish troops and vessels around Cuba before escaping to Jamaica. This was due to the Ten Years' War going on as Cuba was fighting for independence from Spain. I'm not even sure what the next article means - why would the Methodist Conference make locals "scarcer than yellow-legged chickens"? And are yellow-legged chickens even scarce at all?

In New York there were some runs on the banks and Mr. Rea was sentenced to life for killing a kid "for calling him 'Fritz'". Was that a slur of some sort in 1875? Barber Charlie Kuechler is "the jolliest of little fellows" and "an excellent knight of the razor" (quite the accolades!), "Dietrich" had fish for dinner and has 3 "in soak" (they

would write about anything in 1875!) and Mr. Woodward has received the \$850 that was sent to the Indianola Relief Association (the hurricane in September had wrecked the Texas coast).

Simmons' Liver Regulator is "Invaluable for Railroad Men", the railroad is repaired since the hurricane and now there is no need to transfer "passengers or freight", the Mexican War Veterans (this would have been the men who fought for Texas independence) are meeting at the fair, and Mr. Goll is looking for his "mouse colored" stallion that has strayed. I've heard of sorrel, bay, dun, liver, roan, buckskin, and chestnut colored horses before but I've never heard "mouse colored"!


Kingsbury Opry
