Groundhog Day

This coming Saturday, February 2, is Groundhog Day.

According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, there will be six more weeks of **winter** weather; no shadow means an early spring.

On February 2, 1887, Groundhog Day, featuring a rodent meteorologist, is celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. Clymer H. Freas was the editor of the local paper Punxsutawney Spirit at the time, and he began promoting the town's groundhog as the official "Groundhog Day meteorologist".

Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas Day, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal–the hedgehog–as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs, which were plentiful in the Keystone State.

Just what the heck is a groundhog anyway? According to Wikipedia: "The groundhog (*Marmota monax*), also known as a woodchuck, or whistlepig, is a rodent of the family *Sciuridae*, belonging to the group of large ground squirrels known as marmots. The groundhog is also referred to as a chuck, wood-shock, groundpig, whistler, thickwood badger, Canada marmot, monax, moonack, weenusk, and red monk. The name "thickwood badger" was given in the Northwest to distinguish the animal from the prairie badger. Monax was an Indian name of the woodchuck, which meant "the digger". Young groundhogs may be called chucklings. Other marmots, such as the yellow-bellied and hoary marmots, live in rocky and mountainous areas, but the groundhog is a lowland

creature. It is widely distributed in North America and common in the northeastern and central United States and Canada. Groundhogs are found as far north as Alaska, with their habitat extending southeast to Georgia."

There you have it! Do you want 6 more weeks of winter? We haven't had much of one so far so I'm not sure it would make any difference. I'm sure that some of the people up north that are dealing with polar vortexes are looking forward to the groundhog popping up with no shadow in sight.


That says it all, doesn't it?!

Kingsbury News Past

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

The October 17, 1902 edition of the Houston Post had a report of the most recent "Cotton Receipts". Kingsbury looks to be a little ahead of last season with 685 bales. According to the additional detail, Kingsbury farmers are "holding for better prices" while the "better class of farmers" in Tenaha (northeast of Nacogdoches) are selling as fast as they can.



Siron Bostick (his name was actually Sion Record Bostick) passed away at age 82. He was a veteran of the Battle of Gonzales, the Siege of Bexar, the Battle of San Jacinto, and the Battle of Plum Creek. At San Jacinto he was one of three soldiers who captured General Santa Anna and turned him over to the injured General Sam Houston. Elsewhere, smallpox and tuberculosis continue to be a problem across the state, look out for ducks and jacksnipe (I had to look that one up) after the next Norther, and the posses have not yet caught the "fellow" who "perpetrated the criminal assault" at Yarrelton just east of Temple.



Here Comes February

The month of February starts on Friday this week.

The Roman month *Februarius* was named after the Latin term *februum*, which means purification, via the purification ritual *Februa* held on February 15 (full moon) in the old **lunar** Roman calendar. January and February were the last two months to be added to the Roman calendar, since the Romans originally considered winter a monthless period.

February Symbols

Its birth flower is the violet (*Viola*) and the common primrose (*Primula vulgaris*). Its birthstone is the amethyst. It symbolizes piety, humility, spiritual wisdom, and sincerity. Its zodiac signs are Aquarius (until February 19) and Pisces (February 20 onwards).

The February skies are one of the few that are not blessed with meteor showers, but any cloudless night this month is a good time to bundle up and check out the diamonds in the sky. Maybe there will be the odd shooting star to make it special.

There is always one fine week in February.

If bees get out in February, the next day will be windy and rainy.

Fogs in February mean frosts in May.

Winter's back breaks about the middle of February.

Kingsbury Post Office and Drug Store


A picture taken in front of the Kingsbury Post Office and Drug Store in 1912.

In the picture are Jeptha White, Jeptha's sister, Edna White Beaty, Edna's husband Van Beaty, and George Smith.

Jeptha Conrad White (1888-1962) was the pharmacist at the drug store (the "J.C.WHITE" painted on the front window). Edna, Van, and George were all mail carriers in 1912.

When this picture was taken in 1912 (and prior to the fire of 1929), the Post Office and Drug Store were in the middle of the downtown "block".
