
### **Presidents Day**

This Monday, February 18, is Presidents Day.

The story of Presidents' Day date begins in 1800. Following President George Washington's death in 1799, his February 22 birthday became a perennial day of **remembrance**. At the time, Washington was venerated as the most important figure in American history, and events like the 1832 centennial of his birth and the start of construction of the Washington Monument in 1848 were cause for national celebration.

While Washington's Birthday was an unofficial observance for most of the 1800s, it was not until the late 1870s that it became a federal holiday. Senator Steven Wallace Dorsey of Arkansas was the first to propose the measure, and in 1879 President Rutherford B. Hayes signed it into law. The holiday initially only applied to the District of Columbia, but in 1885 it was expanded to the whole country. At the time, Washington's Birthday joined four other nationally recognized federal bank holidays—Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Independence Day and Thanksgiving—and was the first to celebrate the life of an individual American.

While several states still have individual holidays honoring the birthdays of Washington, Abraham Lincoln and other figures, Presidents' Day is now popularly viewed as a day to celebrate all U.S. presidents past and present.






















### **Kingsbury T-Shirts - Now Available Online!**


That says it all, doesn't it?!

### **Community Volunteer Opportunity**

Every community can benefit from volunteers capable of aiding the professionals during emergency situations. People who know the actions to take before, during, and after a **disaster**, safe use of fire extinguishers and extinguishing small fires, simple triage and evaluation of injuries, even search and rescue techniques.

You probably didn't know, but there is a program in Guadalupe County training people for just that kind of thing.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. CERT offers a consistent, nationwide approach to volunteer training and organization that professional responders can rely on during disaster situations, which allows them to focus on more complex tasks. Through CERT, the capabilities to prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters is built and enhanced.

Guadalupe County's CERT Team is developed from multiple volunteers with different backgrounds and will be rebuilding their CERT Team this year.

### **Stopping Forced Annexation**

During the last legislative session, counties in Texas were designated as Tier 1 (less than 500,000 in population) and Tier 2 (greater than 500,000 in population) and the cities in a Tier 2 county can no longer force annex people's property into their city limits - the people get a chance to vote on being annexed or not. If a county is a Tier 1 (like Guadalupe), the cities in it can still forcibly annex properties, giving the annexed property owners no choice but to pay that city's property taxes and abide by their laws, and restrictions.

But there is a way to have a Tier 1 county designated as a Tier 2 and **stop** forced annexations. When 10% of the registered voters in the county sign a petition, the county must add a proposition to the next election that gives the citizens the chance to vote on changing the county to a Tier 2. Several counties in Texas have already had a petition drive to get the Tier 2 designation on the ballot and have voted with a resounding "Yes" - Parker, Wise, Johnson, Freestone, Palo Pinto, Ellis, and Atascosa. Many others, like Guadalupe, are now working to get that proposition on their next ballot.

The City of Kingsbury, by law and by conscience, only annexes when requested by the landowner. The city leaders do not believe in forced annexation and were some of the first to sign the petition to change Guadalupe county to a Tier 2. They can drop off and pick up petition sheets anywhere in the Kingsbury area. Curbside service!

### **Full Super Snow Moon**

The Full Moon for February is the best supermoon of 2019. Traditionally, this Moon was called the Snow Moon.

This full Moon, which **peaks** on Tuesday, February 19, at 9:53 A.M., will be the second of three supermoons to occur in 2019. Traditionally called the Snow Moon, it is being called the "Super Snow" Moon this year to reflect its status as a supermoon.

Although the full Moons of January, February, and March 2019 are all considered supermoons, February's full Moon will actually be at the closest point in its orbit to Earth, making it the largest and brightest full Moon of the year.

Do supermoons truly appear brighter? Technically, yes. Practically, it depends on your point of comparison. The supermoon's diameter is indeed about 7% greater than an ordinary full Moon and 14% greater than a full Moon when it's at its furthest point in its orbit to Earth (a "micromoon").

And a supermoon exceeds the brightness of an ordinary Moon by 15%! When compared to a micromoon, the supermoon is 30% brighter!

### MOON FACTS AND FOLKLORE

On February 6, 1971, Alan Shepard became the first man to hit a golf ball on the Moon.

Did you know that the Moon's diameter is 2,160 miles? This is less than the width of the United States (approximately 3,000 miles), and 0.27 of Earth's diameter (7,926 miles).

And hand in hand, on the edge of the sand, they danced by the light of the Moon.

Also back was Mr. Armstrong "from all over Texas" - I wonder what he was up to?


# WEIMAR LOCALS. A Number of Those Away for the Holidays Have Returned. Welmar, Texas, December 27.—Christmas has come and gone without a single mishap or casualty being reported in this locality, and with it came those of Weimar's citizens, who have been away for a time, to visit the "old folks at home," among them. Cadets Forest Holman and Alexis McComick of the Agricultural and Mechanical college, Otto Henkel from Galveston, Misses Eddle Hill and Alma Herder of the North Texas Female college of Sherman, Miss Berry Hall of San Antonio College for Young Ladies, Miss Jessie Card, from El

Campo; Mr. Claude Armstrong, from all over Texas; Mrs. Jessie Townsend, teaching music at Kingsbury; Mr. Robert Insall, from school at San Marcos, as also Mr. Frest Bittner and Mrs. George Seydler of El Campo, Mrs. Elise Hillje of San Antonio, Mrs. C. O. Harrison of Bonus, Sheriff W. E. Bridge of Columbus, Mr. George E. Wilson, a well known drummer from Texas; Rev. Mr. Barnum of Flatonia, Mr. John Willrich of Gonzales, Hon. W. L. Atkins of Columbus, Mrs. Frank Russek of Skidmore, Prof. August Leppin of Burton, Misses Cora Bell of Del Rio and Mamile La Crosse of Luling Mr. August Olfenbuettel of New York, Post master Weete of Columbus, Messrs. Charles Bock and J. M. Little of Oakland-Shimek section, as also Constable Mayes, Mr. W. A. Trousade of Altair and Colonel Eugene Herndon of Columbus and Mr. Johnnie Herndon of Nacogdoches were pleasant visitors.

Also in the *Post* that day was a beautiful ad for Engelin Stomach Powder that featured little cherubs, a photograph (very rare in newspapers of 1902) of a lady "watching the old year out", and an ad for Schlitz beer that lets you know its aged "so that it cannot cause biliousness" - doesn't *that* make you want to crack open a bottle? Elsewhere, the Oklahoma Territory is merging with the Indian Territory to become the state of Oklahoma (this wouldn't actually happen until 1907), Mr. Miller of Sublime (about 9 miles east of Halletsville on Hwy 90) is missing his "roan buggy horse" (did he take his buggy all the way from Sublime to Houston? That's about 100 miles!), a ship reported that Mount Pelee in the "D.W.I" (Dutch West Indies) is erupting again (a big cause for alarm since the May 1902 eruption killed over 30,000 people), and Settegast & Kopf have a very fancy horse-drawn hearse.







### OKLAHOMA AND STATEHOOD.

Combination with the Indian Territory Is the Desire of the People.

Fort Worth, Texas, December 28.—Samuel C. Massingule of Cordell, O. T., who defeated Judkins, the republican nominee as representative to the territorial council by a majority of 1111, was in the city yesterday, and when asked for an expression on the Statehead question, said: "All business interests in the Territory seem to take the same view of Statehead that the Oklahoma democrats have declared for in their platform—that is, single Statehead, which means one State to be formed of Oklahoma and Indian Territory. St. Thomas, D. W. I., December 27.—
The cable ship Newington, which arrived at St. Lucia, D. W. I., yesterday, reported having passed Mont Asies at 1:30 a. m. Thursday. The volcane was then in violent eruption. Dense clouds of gray smoke and dust were pouring out of the crater and ascending to an enormous height.

There was also a great sale Egyptian rugs, the Southern Pacific has "magnificent dining cars" going to all "Texas points" for the New Year holiday, explorer John Rouse died of starvation "in the wilds of Central Bolivia" in 1900 and the word is just now getting to the States, and a couple of bank robbers made off with quite a haul in Union, Missouri by blowing the safe with "nitro glycerine" which also demolished "the whole front of the bank".





JOHN H. ROUSE STARVED TO DEATH.

Twenty-eight of His Companions Also
Perished in Bolivia.

Scattle, Wash., December 27.—News has just reached here that John H. Rouse starved to death in the wilds of Central Bolivia in June, 1900, while on an exploring trip. But one man out of a party of thirty escaped. Rouse was one of the ploneer mining men of Washington, coming first to this section in 1878. On his last trip he was one of a party representing the Bolivian government. His friends will ask the department of state to investigate his death.

### BANK ROBBERY IN MISSOURI.

The Bandits Secured Fifteen Thousand Dollars from the Safe. Union, Mo., December 27.—The Bank of

Union was burglarized between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning, the vault being blown open with nitro glycerine and \$15,000, the entire contents of the safe, stolen. The robbers were two in number and are believed to be professionals. They escaped. A little after 1 o'clock a loud explosion was heard and several shots were fired around the public square. Most of the citizens who heard the noise supposed it was caused by some boys out on a lark, celebrating Christmas, and pand no attention to it. Oscar Busch, a hardware dealer, living across the street, remitzed that the bank was being robbed, but when he went to the window to look out was covered by a revolver. He then kept quiet. Others also were kept quiet by a display of revolvers. About fifty shots were fired to terrorize venture-some persons. Notwithstanding contrary reports, Mr. Busch says but two men left the bank after the robbery.

The wreck was complete, the vault door and the safe being completely demolished, as was the whole iront of the bank. By 3 o'clock the men left town, walking toward the east. F. F. Richard, the president of the bank, was very sick at his home, and he was not told of the robbery. A. W. Hoffmann, the cashier, was called after it was all over. He estimates the loss at about \$15,000. The bank carried \$10,000 insurance against burglary. There is no clew to the robbers.
