
That says it all, doesn't it?!

Hello April

This week will see the first days of the new month of April!

The Romans gave this month the Latin name *Aprilis* but the derivation of this name is uncertain. The traditional etymology is from the verb *aperire*, "to open", in allusion to its being the season when trees and **flowers** begin to "open."

When April blows its horn, It's good for hay and corn.



April's birth flower is the daisy or sweet pea.



The diamond is the traditional birthstone of April and holds significant meaning for those born in that month, thought to provide the wearer with better relationships and an increase in inner strength.

The zodiac signs for the month of April are Aries (until April 19) and Taurus (April 20 onwards).



April is a good month to check out the night skies for meteor showers!

Considered to be the oldest known meteor shower, the Lyrids are named after constellation Lyra are are created by debris from the comet Thatcher, which takes about 415 years to orbit around the Sun. The radiant point of the shower, the point in the sky where the meteors seem to emerge from, lies near the star Vega, one of the brightest stars in the sky during this time of the year. Astronomers suggest looking up towards the east to see these shooting stars. The Lyrids are a medium strength shower that usually produces good rates for three nights centered on the maximum. These meteors also usually lack persistent trains but can produce fireballs. The Lyrids last from about April 16th to 25th. About 10 to 15 meteors per hour can be expected around the shower's peak. The Lyrids are known for uncommon surges that can sometimes bring the rate up to 100 per hour. Those rare outbursts are not easy to predict, but they're one of the reasons the tantalizing Lyrids are worth checking out.

In 2020, expect the peak viewing hours to take place in the hours before dawn April 22, with no moon to ruin the show!

April Fools Day

This week, on April 1st is that very special day - April Fool's Day!


In 1700, English pranksters begin popularizing the annual tradition of April Fools' Day by playing practical jokes on each other.

Although the day, also called All Fools' Day, has been celebrated for several centuries by different cultures, its exact origins remain a mystery. Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as called for by the Council of Trent in 1563. People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1 and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1 became the butt of jokes and hoaxes.

In modern times, people have gone to great lengths to create elaborate April Fools' Day hoaxes. Newspapers, radio and TV stations and Web sites have participated in the April 1 tradition of reporting outrageous fictional claims that have fooled their audiences. In 1957, the BBC reported that Swiss farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop and showed footage of people harvesting noodles from trees; numerous viewers were fooled. In 1985, Sports Illustrated tricked many of its readers when it ran a made-up article about a rookie pitcher

named Sidd Finch who could throw a fastball over 168 miles per hour. In 1998, after Burger King advertised a "Left-Handed Whopper," scores of clueless customers requested the fake sandwich.

In 1980, BBC's overseas news service announced that London's iconic clock tower, Big Ben, was going to be given a digital readout as a facelift to keep up with current times. This prank backfired when BBC staff received many calls from listeners who were furious. It had to spend several days apologizing to listeners for the prank.



Kingsbury School and Methodist Church

This building was originally the first Kingsbury school house in the 1800s.

The building was probably sitting in this picture right were it is now - at the corner of FM 2438 and Caldwell Street. At the time, FM 2438 was called Center Street and was a dirt road. The original plat of Kingsbury shows the name "Center Street" and the larger plot that the school building, now the Methodist Church, was on.
